
SUMMARY FOR THE PERIOD (APRIL 12 – 19, 2020)




CIVIL DEFENCE COMMISION'S ACTIONS


- Leading the functioning of the National Emergency Operations Center (NEOC)
- Maintaining a ready and functioning 24 hours National Emergency Monitoring System to augment the national response
- Liaising closely with the Health Emergency Center (HEOC) to enhance operational efficiency
- Providing key recommendations to members of the Task Force on strategic and tactical consideration to guide national response efforts
- Coordinating and managing volunteers engaged in various roles and functions of the response
- Liaising with groups and organisations to track vulnerable persons and impacts, and to prioritise for distribution of hampers
- Liaising with groups and organisations to track donations of relief supplies across the country
- Supporting the MoPH in coordination of quarantine and isolation facilities
- Conducted joint assessments to identify suitable locations that may be used as isolation and quarantine facilities
- Conducted focused meetings with Private Sector, governmental and nongovernmental partners to streamline response efforts
- Conducted meeting with relevant partners to explore possibility of alternative farmers' fresh food markets
- Conducted meeting with MoSP and other relevant partners to explore alternative mechanisms for payment of pensions to promote social distancing
- Conducted assessment of the needs of the Orealla/Siparuta community in support of the MOFA to seek diplomatic solutions on the blockade established as a key measure to contain COVID19 by the Surinamese authorities.

- Implementation of assessment to identify priority needs and impacts to guide social interventions
- Medical supplies and equipment (including Personal Protective Equipment) to support medical response
- Laboratory agents and consumables for testing
